

<u>December 2020</u>: Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Connecticut, D.C. sign MOU to launch TCI-P.


In an accompanying statement, eight other Northeast, Mid-Atlantic, and Southeast states signaled that they will continue to work on the development of the details of the regional program.





Transportation and Climate Initiative Program

March 2021: TCI-P jurisdictions release draft model rule and updates on public engagement planning for public input





TCI-P Program Goals

- Reduce carbon dioxide (CO₂) emissions from transportation sources
- Improve air quality and public health, increase resilience to the impacts of climate change, and provide more affordable access to clean transportation choices
- Promote local economic opportunity and create high quality jobs
- Maximize the efficiency of this multijurisdictional program to ensure greater benefits
- Advance equity for communities overburdened by pollution and underserved by the transportation system




Health and Safety Benefits from TCI-P

- All public input received is accessible on the TCI website





Draft Framework for Public Engagement(Guiding Principles)

- 1. Each TCI-P jurisdiction will work with their stakeholders to create, or adapt existing, public engagement plans.
- 2. Build trust through honest and open exchanges of information.
- Encourage active community participation.
- 4. Recognize community knowledge and expertise.
- Make public engagement accessible for everyone (e.g. language and disability access).
- 6. Build capacity for sustained, long-term community engagement that can exist beyond the TCI-P implementation process.

What is the "Model Rule"?

- Serves as a common framework that each participating jurisdiction will use to develop the regulations detailing compliance requirements for fuel suppliers
- Designed to ensure that participating jurisdictions use consistent approaches to regulating and enforcing a declining cap on carbon emissions from transportation fuels under the program.



TCI-P Model Implementation Plan

- Each jurisdiction will develop a TCI-P
 Implementation Plan describing the
 steps it will take to advance the goals
 and commitments of the TCI-P program
 and of the TCI-P MOU
- TCI-P Model Implementation Plan provides a common framework for jurisdictions to follow in developing their own Implementation Plans
- Draft TCI-P Model Implementation Plan <u>published today for public input</u>











TCI-P Model Implementation Plan

- Establishing or designating Equity Advisory Body
- Defining "Underserved and Overburdened Communities"
- Working with stakeholders to develop a public engagement plan with special emphasis on equity considerations
- Adopting jurisdiction-specific rules based on the Model Rule
- Ensuring transparency and accountability regarding TCI-P implementation and progress toward achieving program goals
- Investing proceeds and creating high-quality jobs through transparent processes
- Collaborating with other participating jurisdictions to administer
 TCI-P
- Advancing additional policies to help achieve TCI-P goals











Draft Proposed Strategies for Regional Collaboration

 Policies and programs proposed as components of TCI-P jurisdiction Implementation Plans



 TCI-P jurisdictions propose to pursue these strategies in collaboration with each other



 Public input is invited on how these proposals and other strategies could help to further reduce emissions and achieve other program TCI-P goals, including direct benefits for overburdened and underserved communities.







Draft Proposed Strategies for Regional Collaboration


 Air quality monitoring in communities overburdened by air pollution to ensure transparency regarding the effectiveness of emissions reduction policies



- Ensuring high-quality domestic jobs and workforce development;
- Investing in transit to ensure safe, reliable and equitable service.



 Coordinating public engagement and implementation plans to replace diesel trucks and buses with zero emissions vehicles;
