








### Equality assumes everyone needs the same thing. Equity meets everyone's needs.



### **GREEN FOR ALL** What are some concerns?



 $\bigstar$  Market 'flexibilities' mean cap isn't a guarantee



Price gets passed onto consumers, creating a regressive burden on low-income



Benefits of investments (tax credits, etc) go towards whiter, wealthier communities



Local air quality in overburdened areas are not guaranteed, could be exacerbated







Carbon pricing must be intentionally crafted to rectify environmental injustice. It's not enough to say, there's the potential that you'll benefit. We have to, in the actual policy, write criteria that is going to ensure real benefits."

- Don't let polluters off the hook.

## Don't let polluters off the hook

- Set a strong cap
- No free allowances
- Set a 'floor' price
- Limit credit banking
- Strictly limit offsets no offsets for projects outside of the region





## Conduct an equity analysis

To achieve equitable outcomes, states must define goals and metrics for:

- Localized environmental benefits for climate-vulnerable communities
- Localized air quality benefits for overburdened communities
- Economic benefits for low-income brackets
- Access and mobility to isolated
- Workforce development





## Ensure communities are at the table

- Establish an advisory committee with diverse stakeholder groups, including community residents
- Require project proposals be developed alongside community partners
- Dedicate 20% of funds to capacity for community groups



## Dedicate investments to benefit disadvantaged communities

- Advisory groups help define 'disadvantaged communities' in each state.
- Designate minimum of 50% proceeds go to direct benefits in those communities.
- Track and report





## Set criteria to maximize co-benefits

Use 'Best-Value' analysis to maximize co-benefits of ghg reductions, human health, good jobs, cost savings, and mobility.

- Advisory groups help define co-benefits and metrics in each state.
- Co-benefits should be weighed and evaluated when making investment decisions.

## Protect against discrimination

Prohibit discrimination, directly or indirectly, intentionally or unintentionally, on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, disability, age, gender identity, sexual orientation, citizenship status, or criminal background in any use of the funds, including contractors, vendors, and companies receiving rebates or tax credits. ## Guaranteed emission reductions in fenceline communities

- Overburdened communities immediately receive air quality monitoring resources
- Establish complementary policies to ensure emission reductions in fenceline communities
- Enact air quality protections before the start of the program



## Ensure fairness for workers and communities



Funding for projects should be tied to:

- enforcing fair labor standards
- diversifying the workforce
- supporting women, minority, and veteran-owned businesses.

20% of proceeds should go to workforce development



### Recover value for public

good

- Don't privatize public transportation services
- Investments should not undermine public transportation where it's available
- Ride-hailing data should be shared, and policies to manage ride-hailing impacts should be considered



## Protect against displacement



- Pass renter protections
- Invest in affordable housing near transit
- Require new large developments include affordable housing units
- Commercial developments help fund nearby affordable housing
- When expanding transit, engage the community.
